- Canada ratified the Joint Convention (JC) in June 2001
- "Team Canada" approach
 led by Canadian Nuclear
 Safety Commission
 (CNSC), with input from
 Natural Resources Canada
 and industry








Canada's Commitment to Safety

- Comprehensive legislative/regulatory framework
- Independent, open and transparent regulator
- Licensees are responsible for safety
- Nuclear industry in Canada is committed to nuclear safety
- Initiatives to address long-term waste management policies











Objectives of the Joint Convention

- Allows Canada to perform a structured self assessment of the adequacy of its adopted safety measures
- Provides a process for regular international peer review every three years
- Provides an international forum for co-operation and experience sharing for both regulators and industry
- Provides opportunity to learn about decommissioning strategies and the international status of deep geological repositories
- Assures the public that national arrangements for spent fuel and radioactive waste management are in conformance with international agreements
- Canada's National Reports are excellent, detailed and up-to-date references that are publicly available

Waste safety is a global responsibility







Issues for the Joint Convention and Contracting Parties - Next 20 Years

- Global champion for waste safety to the same rigour as security and safeguards
- Encourage Contracting Parties (CPs) to include findings of their Integrated Regulatory Review Service missions in their National Reports
- Encourage CPs to make reports, action plans and follow-up publicly available
- Contribute to the social acceptability of long-term waste management solutions

Canada encourages Contracting Parties to commit to peer reviews, openness and transparency









Successes of the *Convention on Nuclear Safety*Shared with the Joint Convention

- Introduce the concept of "Areas of Good Performance"
- Publish all national reports on the public site within 90 days of the Review Meeting unless objection obtained
- Webstream and invite journalists to the opening plenary and the part of the closing plenary where the summary report is adopted
