## Re: Bruce Power's Regulatory Oversight Report

Dear Senior Tribunal Officer,

I am writing to acknowledge Bruce Power for their continuous efforts and commitment to safety, as well as their ongoing support for community wellbeing.

As the host municipality for Bruce Power, we understand and appreciate the strong, independent oversight role the CNSC plays, providing another layer of safety for the nuclear industry and our community. We thank the commission for the opportunity to provide input to this process. We also appreciate that the results of the independent review are available for our residents and for all Canadians to see, which highlights the transparency of the nuclear industry in Canada.

Bruce Power continues to have a strong safety record for operations of the site. This is something that we have come to expect as their dedicated and professional employees are our neighbours and friends.

The company is dedicated to making safety a top priority and works collaboratively with the municipality to enhance emergency preparedness. For example, each year Bruce Power collaborates with the municipality and other applicable organizations (Bruce County Social Services, Bruce County EMS, Red Cross, the Province of Ontario, etc..) to enact a mock emergency to test our emergency preparedness. These regular, realistic exercises help improve safety, build confidence, ensure preparedness, and strengthen community cohesiveness.

The Municipality and Bruce Power have had a positive and collaborative working relationship since the company was formed in 2001. Bruce Power is the largest employer in our municipality and the Major Component Replacement (MCR) project has attracted over 30 nuclear suppliers into the community. Plans for Bruce C are also in the beginning stages and will have a direct
