Subject: Support letter for Ontario Power Generation's application for an extension of their license to operate Units 5 to 8 to the end of 2026

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing to you on behalf of Abilities Centre in support of an application submitted by Ontario Power Generation for an amendment to the current licence. The amendment would allow them to operate Units 5 to 8 to the end of 2026, an additional two years. As Ontario's other nuclear stations undergo refurbishment, there is a need for additional electricity through to 2026. OPG would then prepare those units for refurbishment which will begin in 2028 (pending regulatory approval).

The current licence includes operations to the end of 2024, followed by safe storage activities to the end of 2028. OPG have reviewed their proposed shutdown plan for Pickering Nuclear Generating Station and concluded that the facility can continue to safely generate electricity through September 2026.

Abilities Centre is a charitable organization with a comprehensive, multi-sectoral approach to accessibility and inclusion. As a community hub, research lab, and inclusion incubator, we develop universally designed employment; recreation; skills development, and training programs; lead research and advocacy on inclusion issues; and develop innovative frameworks for programs that are replicable and scalable to the needs of communities across Canada. These programs address specific accessibility and inclusion gaps for identified stakeholder groups within our mandate of improving quality of life by supporting health and wellness, social inclusion, and economic participation.

While we are not experts by any means in nuclear energy or the safe operation of nuclear facilities, we have been in partnership with OPG for over a decade and have come to view them as trustworthy partners that place the needs of their communities at the forefront of everything that they do. As such, we support their request for an amendment to the current licence.
