



## **Purpose and Outline**

Consideration of Cameco's request to revoke the Beaverlodge licence, to allow transfer of the site to Saskatchewan's Institutional Control Program (ICP)

## **INSTITUTIONAL CONTROL PROGRAM IN SASKATCHEWAN**

### Institutional Control Program in Saskatchewan What is the ICP?

- Outlines a formal regulatory process for long term property management of mine and mill sites by the Province of Saskatchewan
- Transfer of properties/facilities into ICP can only occur after:
  - Decommissioning is complete
  - Properties are safe and stable
  - Sufficient funds in place for monitoring and maintenance and unforeseen events
  - No longer regulated by any other level of government

Only low risk properties are accepted by the Province into ICP



### Institutional Control Program in Saskatchewan Summary of Process

Licensee applies for release from CNSC licensing and requests release from MOE oversight. If conditions are met, MOE and MER state that property(ies) can be transferred. CNSC staff also confirm properties can be released.

If conditions are met, Commission can consider granting release from current licence and exemption from future licensing.

If released and exempted from licensing, property(ies) are added to the ICP Registry and managed by the Province.



# Institutional Control Program in Saskatchewan CNSC's Role

Coordinated and cooperative approach with Province

### **Legislative Authority**

- Section 7 of the Nuclear Safety and Control Act
- Section 11 of the General Nuclear Safety and Control Regulations

CNSC staff will only recommend transfers into the ICP for successfully decommissioned sites



- Located in northwestern
   Saskatchewan, near Uranium City
- Operated (1952-1982)
- Decommissioned (1982-1985)
- Monitoring and Maintenance (1985-Present)

## Site Overview and History Recent CNSC Licensing (1/2)

#### Commission Decision (No. 1)

- Released 5 properties from the licence, exempted Province
- 5 properties transferred to ICP

Issued 3-year licence

#### **Annual Updates**

- More than 20 studies completed; remedial options were selected
- CNSC staff reviewed and accepted the results of these studies and path forward

#### **Licence Renewal**

Commission accepted path forward and issued Cameco a 10-year licence

- Defined performance objectives indicators
- Property-by-property timeline estimates for IC transfer eligibility



Properties proposed for release:



## **Environmental Protection Review & SCAs**

#### General assessment of SCAs is completed:

All relevant safety and control areas rated as 'satisfactory'

CNSC staff performed an Environmental Protection Review under the Nuclear Safety and Control Act: Properties proposed for release are performing as expected

CNSC staff concluded there has and will be adequate provision for the protection of the environment

# Long Term Monitoring, Maintenance and Reporting

#### Monitoring and maintenance activities outlined and budgeted

- Monitoring (waste rock, caps, vegetation, crown pillar, etc.) and maintenance of physical structures (mine caps, etc.)
- Water quality monitoring and comparison to long term predictions
- Long-term water quality and fish chemistry monitoring program

#### Federal Crown commitment for obligations and liabilities (failure event)

#### **MER monitors and manages sites**

- Inspection reports and financial status of ICP available to the public on-line
- Funds provided to undertake outreach/engagement once site is in the ICP



## Uranium City Area IEMP

The CNSC's Independent Environmental Monitoring Program (IEMP) is an added measure to verify that the public and environment are protected

CNSC staff engaged directly with Indigenous Nations and communities. Sampling included:

- Surface water
- Blueberries/Cranberries
- Fish (various species) Labrador tea
- Spruce Grouse
- Moose

All results are consistent with past results and with CNSC staff expectations; all data is available to the public on the CNSC's <u>IEMP website</u>.

# **CNSC staff** identified Indigenous Nations and communities who have rights or interests in relation to the Beaverlodge Project


February 2024: Letters of notification sent

**April 2024**: Follow-up emails and virtual meetings with offers to meet to discuss further

August 2024: Funding awarded though CNSC's Participant Funding Program

October 2024: Link for CMDs sent to all interested Nations

November 2024 to January 2025: Project updates and ongoing discussions on the Beaverlodge Project and opportunities to collaborate on regional data gathering and mapping





# Indigenous Consultation & Engagement (slide 3/3)

- Community meeting in Fort Chipewyan
- Oversight of Cameco's engagement activities and reporting as per REGDOC 3.2.2, *Indigenous Engagement*
- Awarded funding and initiated dialogue on Uranium City regional mapping exercise
- Encourage Province to conduct on-going engagement & collaboration with Indigenous Nations and communities as part of the ICP

# Participant Funding Program

### The Participant Funding Program provides funds to assist members of the public and Indigenous Nations and communities in providing valuable information on licensing actions, directly to the Commission

Funding was awarded in the amount of **\$188,259** 

#### Funding awarded to:

- Métis Nation-Saskatchewan
- Ya'thi Néné Land and Resource Office
- Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation
- Nuclear Transparency Project



## Interventions (1/2)

CNSC received 11 interventions, main themes included:

- Supportive comments from some companies, associations, residents
- Indigenous engagement and consultation, Duty to Consult and Treaty Rights
- Safety of properties and consumption of traditional foods
- Data availability

## Interventions (2/2)

### Other key themes included:

- Performance indicators
- Issues raised at past Hearings
- Cumulative effects
- CNSC's continued oversight
- Long Term Monitoring Program
- Engagement and involvement once site is in the ICP



## **CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS**



## Conclusions

### **CNSC staff concluded that:**

- All 27 properties proposed for release from licensing and exemption from future CNSC licensing meet the applicable performance indicators and regulatory acceptance criteria
- No unreasonable risk to environment or health and safety of persons
- The ICP will provide ongoing regulatory oversight by a competent authority for those properties that require long term monitoring and control

CNSC staff have conducted consultation and engagement activities with Indigenous Nations and communities in support of meeting consultation obligations and upholding the honour of the Crown




## Recommendations

# CNSC staff recommend that the Commission consider the following actions:

- **Revoke** Waste Facility Operating Licence WFOL-W5-2120.0/2025
- **Exempt** the Government of Saskatchewan from licensing under the *Nuclear Safety and Control Act* for the 27 properties proposed for transfer into Saskatchewan's Institutional Control Program







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
