

#### Kebaowek First Nation's Presentation to the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission

June 2025

Asserting Indigenous Rights, Environmental Protection, and Regulatory Accountability





### Rights and Scope of Concern

- Kebaowek First Nation (KFN) holds constitutionally protected rights and title over lands affected by Nordion's facility.
- The facility is located within asserted KFN territory.
- Application seeks a 25-year licence a decision with intergenerational consequences.
- CNSC has **not met** its obligations under the NSCA, UNDA, or UNDRIP.



## Consultation Must Be UNDRIP Compliant

- The duty to consult has been triggered and must meet the FPIC standard (Free, Prior, and Informed Consent).
- No direct engagement on the Application with KFN; Nordion and CNSC have failed to consider Ona'ken'age'win (KFN's Indigenous law).
- The Federal Court has affirmed that UNDRIP elevates the consultation standard to one that is robust, consent-based, and tailored to Indigenous laws and knowledge



### The Need for Environmental Justice

- Nordion waste is shipped to Chalk River, located on Algonquin lands.
- KFN has not received full disclosure on waste contents, volumes, or environmental risks.
- Cobalt-60 and Mo-99 processing creates long-term radioactive waste —
  yet KFN communities receive no benefit, only burden.
- Granting the licence will inhibit Canada's ability to meet its commitments set out in the National Strategy Respecting Environmental Racism and Environmental Justice Act.



# Gaps in Nuclear Safety and Radiation Protection

- No clear justification provided for Nordion's nuclear operations under international safety standards.
- Gaps in safety incident reporting and transparency (e.g. irradiator door malfunction, waste emissions).
- CNSC has not aligned its review with the radiation protection principle of justification.
  - Justification is among the core radiation safety principles adopted by the IAEA in their
    Fundamental Safety Principles and International Basic Safety Standards



# Kebaowek's Position on the 25-Year Licence

- KFN opposes the 25-year term:
  - Reduces accountability and engagement (consultation is an ongoing obligation)
  - Weakens regulatory oversight and erodes transparency
- KFN urges the Commission to:
  - Deny the requested 25-year licence renewal
  - Recognize FPIC, environmental justice, and Indigenous law in decision-making
  - Establish a nation-to-nation consultation framework with KFN
