





Legacy Waste Management Areas at Chalk River Laboratories










Waste Management Area A: 1946 - 1956










Waste Management Area F: 1976 - 1980

- Based on international best practices




Responsible Water Management

- Controlled discharge to environment after effluent targets met


The Site Is Appropriate

Only Low-Level Waste

"Low-level radioactive waste (LLW) contains material with radionuclide content above established clearance levels and exemption quantities, but generally has limited amounts of long-lived activity. LLW requires isolation and containment for periods of up to a few hundred years and is suitable for disposal in near surface facilities." 1,2,3






