

RIB Action #19575 – Update on Decision on Radionuclides as Chemicals of Mutual Concern

#### **ISSUE**

During the Pickering Nuclear Generating Station relicensing hearing in 2018, the Commission requested comments from CNSC staff and Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) on the nomination of radionuclides as chemicals of mutual concern under the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement. These discussions were summarized in Paragraph 414 of the Pickering Licence Renewal Record of Decision (e-Doc: <u>5718117</u>) with a request that the Commission be updated on the decision made by ECCC on the nomination.

To date, two updates have been provided to the Secretariat, 2019 (e-Doc: 6067323) and 2020 (e-Doc: 6443947), both indicating that no decision had been made by ECCC on the nomination.

This memo is to provide a third update for RIB Action #19575.

# **BACKGROUND**

The <u>Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement</u> (GLWQA) is an agreement between Canada and the United States, first signed in 1972. It was amended in 2012 and includes Annex 3: Chemicals of Mutual Concern. A key objective of this annex is to identify Chemicals of Mutual Concern (CMCs) from anthropogenic sources, and that are agreed to by both countries as being potentially harmful to human health or the environment. One way that chemicals can be considered as a CMC is through being nominated by external stakeholders. This is the process that a group of 110 non-governmental organizations (the nominators) followed in filing with the Great Lakes Executive Committee co-chairs a proposal to nominate radionuclides as a CMC on March 2, 2016.

The CNSC undertook an assessment of the nomination at the request of ECCC and published its <u>findings</u> on the CNSC website in April 2018. Similarly, the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission (US NRC) undertook its own assessment at the request of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA). Both assessments are posted on <u>Binational.net</u>, which is the single website on joint work

undertaken by the Governments of Canada and the United States regarding the GLWQA. Both regulatory bodies concluded that radionuclides are not recommended as a candidate CMC for further evaluation under Annex 3 of the GLWQA.

# **UPDATE**

To provide a consistent framework for reviewing all nominated CMCs under the GLWQA, ECCC and the US EPA developed and recently posted (June 2021) <u>binational screening criteria</u>. This was accompanied by a "<u>Guidance Document for Annex 3 Nominations</u>" and an "<u>Example CMC Nomination</u>". ECCC has informed the CNSC that the original nominators for radionuclides had indicated that they would like time to revise their nomination package to align with the new binational screening criteria.

At the December 2021 biannual meetings of the Great Lakes Executive Committee, the Annex 3 co-leads confirmed that the original nominators for radionuclides are preparing a revised package. The revised package is expected to be submitted in early 2022.

CNSC will continue to support ECCC as needed on this initiative such as an assessment of the revised nomination package.

Another update will be provided to the Commission via memo at the end of 2022.
