Dear Commissioners,

On behalf of the Primrose Developments LP, and our members in Cole Bay, Jans Bay, Beauval, and Île-à-la-Crosse, I am writing to share our perspectives on Denison Mines work and partnership in our region. PDLP was established to support economic participation, business development, and community sustainability for our member communities across the northwest. Our organization exists to ensure that northern residents not only benefit from development in our region but are active participants and partners in shaping it.

PDLP respectfully requests to intervene by way of written submission at the upcoming Public Hearing – Denison Mines Corporation (CMD 25-H9).

Through the Sustainable Communities Investment Agreement, PDLP has built a strong working relationship with Denison Mines. This agreement allows our organization and communities to actively participate in contracts, build business capacity, and form strategic partnerships that prepare us for future opportunities in the region.

Our efforts are focused on building well-rounded capacity that includes ventures such as Primrose–Allen Construction (JV) and Impact Mechanical, of which Primrose is a 50% owner. We continue to explore further business growth opportunities, such as adding a hydrovac truck to our fleet, to strengthen our ability to participate in and deliver industrial contracts. We are able to plan ahead and prepare because Denison ensures we are informed about potential opportunities.

Denison has also expressed support for our intention to catalogue and manage regional human resources, helping us better understand the existing skills and capacities across the northwest. Unlike many others, Denison was eager to assist, recognizing that building local capability strengthens everyone involved.

Their actions demonstrate respect for our communities' right to succeed on our own terms. Denison values collaboration, training, and employment opportunities that lift our communities and ensure we are players in the industry, not bystanders. They have set a new standard for working with communities rather than simply in them.

In closing, PDLP commends Denison Mines for its consistent leadership, integrity, and community-centered approach. We view Denison as a model partner, one that values self-determination, respects local priorities, and works in parallel with business and community to contribute sustainable futures for northern Saskatchewan.
